2008-09 Point No Point Treaty Council In-Common Sea Cucumber Regulation #S08-117

October 13, 2008

The following regulation is promulgated by the Point No Point Treaty Council and shall govern the conduct of off-reservation commercial and subsistence sea cucumber fisheries by the Port Gamble S'Klallam and the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribes (PNPTC Member Tribes). This regulation is intended to conform to agreements reached between the Puget Sound Treaty Tribes and the State of Washington as contained in the 2008-09 Addendum to the Puget Sound (Excluding Central Sound) 2007-2008 Sea Cucumber Harvest Management Plan. The term of this regulation is from May 1, 2008 through April 30, 2009. Ceremonial and on-reservation fisheries shall be conducted under the provisions of the individual Tribal Fisheries Ordinances and Regulations. All areas not specifically opened by this regulation shall remain closed to the harvest of sea cucumbers. Only gear and methods specifically authorized by this regulation may be legally used.

1. SPECIES

Sea Cucumbers (*Parastichopus californicus*)

2. FISHING AREAS

For the Jamestown S'Klallam and Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribes: Catch Reporting Areas: 20B, 22A, 23A, 23B, 23C, 23D, 25A, 25B, 25C, 25D, 25E, 27A, 27B (north of an east-west line from Ayock Pt.) and catch area 29.

3. MANAGEMENT PERIOD

May 1, 2008 through April 30, 2009.

4. FISHERIES OPENINGS

All areas listed in Section 2 of this regulation, with exceptions listed in Section 5 below, will be opened by emergency regulation, and will remain open through April 30, 2009, or until each total tribal regional harvest quota is taken, whichever comes first. The 2008-09 tribal regional harvest quotas, in pounds of split, drained sea cucumbers, are as follows:

San Juan Region:	286,500
Strait of Juan de Fuca:	78,000
Hood Canal:	0*

* Due to persistent low dissolved oxygen events in Hood Canal, the parties agree that no sea cucumber fisheries will occur in this region during the 2008-09 season.

5. CLOSED AREAS

The following specific areas shall remain closed to fishing at all times:

- A. Those waters of San Juan Channel and Upright Channel within the following lines: north and west of a line from the northernmost point of Turn Island on San Juan Island to Flat Point on Lopez Island and thence projected from Flat Point true west to Shaw Island, north of a line projected from the northernmost point of Turn Island true west to San Juan Island, west of a line from Neck Point on Shaw Island to Steep Point on Orcas Island, and south of a line from Steep Point on Orcas Island to Limestone Point on San Juan Island.
- B. Those waters of Haro Strait north of a line projected due-west from the southernmost point of Cattle Point on San Juan Island to the international border, and south of a line projected due-west from a point one-quarter mile north of Lime Kiln Light on San Juan Island to the international border.
- C. Those waters within one-quarter mile of Tatoosh Island at 0.0 tide height.
- D. Argyle Lagoon: Those University of Washington-owned tidelands and all bedlands enclosed by the inner spit of Argyle Lagoon on San Juan Island.

6. GEAR USE LIMITATIONS

- A. Dive Fishery: Harvest equipment is restricted to individual harvest by hand. Divers may harvest sea cucumbers using surface supplied or self-contained breathing apparatus.

7. HARVEST RESTRICTIONS

- A. All tribal commercial sea cucumber harvesters planning to participate in the 2008-2009 commercial sea cucumber fishery must register at their tribal fisheries office prior to

- participating in the fishery. At the time of registering, the name of the harvester and vessel each harvester plans to dive from shall be reported.
- B. All harvesting shall be conducted in accordance with individual tribal management ordinances/plans, rules, and safety standards governing sea cucumber and other dive fisheries.
 - C. All areas are currently closed to sea cucumber trawl fisheries. Trawl fisheries may resume in certain areas with the agreement of appropriate State and Tribal parties.
 - D. The subsistence fishery daily catch limit per fisher for all areas is 25 sea cucumbers per day. There are no size limits.

8. HARVEST REPORTING

- A. All tribal sea cucumber harvesters, both commercial and take home, must provide daily harvest information to their respective tribal fisheries office. This harvest information can be reported either by a telephone call within 24 hours of each harvest or by mailing/delivering daily harvest logs the first Wednesday of each month. Commercial dive harvest information will include the following for each day fished: date of harvest, vessel name or boat registration number, location fished (nearest landmark, bay or LORAN/GPS reading), pounds landed, average depth of harvest, number of divers, and total diver hours spent fishing. Commercial trawl harvest information will include the following for each day fished: date, vessel name or boat registration number, location fished (nearest landmark, bay, or LORAN/GPS reading), pounds of cucumbers caught, pounds of cucumbers sold, trawl width, tow speed, duration of tow, depth fished, pounds of Dungeness crab caught and shell condition thereof, pounds of fish caught, and the total pounds of other non-cucumber species taken.
- B. All commercial and take home catches shall also be reported on Treaty Indian Fish Receiving tickets as specified in Tribal Fisheries Ordinances. It should be noted on the ticket whether the harvest was reported as whole weight cucumbers or a presumptive split and drained weight. If a presumptive split and drained weight is used to report landings of whole weight cucumbers, a correction factor of 0.50 will be applied to the whole weight to estimate the split and drained weight. Harvest summaries by region will be sent to all affected parties on a monthly basis.
- C. For the 2008-2009 season, the PNPTC Tribes will provide cucumber harvest summaries to the database maintained on the Northwest Indian Fisheries Commission web site. The catch data source for this database will either be fish tickets, monitor or harvest

logs, or buyer reports, whichever is deemed most appropriate by the Tribes. Harvest information will be summarized weekly and will be transmitted to the NWIFC web manager each week. Harvest information will include the tribe, the date, the species, the catch reporting area and sub-area of harvest, the gear type, the ticket count or number of landings, and the total harvest weight.

9. EMERGENCY REGULATIONS

The above regulations may be amended at any time by emergency regulations. Prior to harvest, each fisher shall check with their tribal fishery office for emergency regulation changes.

10. AUTHORITY

The above in-common regulations are promulgated by the Point No Point Treaty Council under the authority delegated by the member Tribes.
